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BridgeValley Community and Technical College Offers Real World Experience to Students

(South Charleston, WV) - Late last year, BridgeValley Community and Technical College began providing students enrolled in its Administrative Professional Technology program, the opportunity to gain real world work experience on campus while continuing to pursue their educational goals.

The new program, which has allowed BridgeValley to hire two students thus far, allows students to work onsite as office and administrative professionals while earning income and college credit.

After reading about a similar program in New Hampshire to solve a workforce turnover problem in the insurance industry, BridgeValley's Workforce and Economic Development Division Vice President Laura McCullough was intrigued and began to devise ways a similar program could be launched at the college.

Developed in accordance with the basic standards recommended by the United States Department of Labor, Office of Apprenticeship, the new apprenticeship provides student workers with an hourly wage and 12 units of coursework upon completion of 4,000 hours of on-the-job training. Students selected to join the BridgeValley workforce, are provided with the same benefits as BridgeValley employees upon their hire date and every six months students are evaluated and provided a slight wage increase, pending they are meeting the requirements of the position.

"We're using the Board of Governors degree program for this," said McCullough. "In two years, they have a full-time job at a higher pay grade than they could have coming in and they have an associate degree. It's good for the worker/student and great for the college. We're replicating our workforce in a way we want them trained."

McCullough said BridgeValley intends to seek out community and business partners interested in offering apprenticeships to the college's students.

"Just about every occupation is apprentice-able," said McCullough. "We need to manage this transition to a young workforce. The idea of an apprentice is to hire someone not qualified

and train them the way you want them to be trained. You figure out what tasks need to be done. It's a way to train your workforce."
